WELCOME TO THE MIDLANDS AIR AMBULANCE CHARITY

The Midlands Air Ambulance Charity is responsible for funding and operating three air ambulances serving the communities of Gloucestershire, Herefordshire, Shropshire, Staffordshire, Worcestershire and the West Midlands. This constitutes the largest air ambulance operating region in the UK.

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Since 1991, the charity has completed over 40,000 air ambulance missions averaging 2,000 per year, making it one of the longest established and busiest air ambulance organisations in the UK.

The charity's three aircraft each carries a crew comprising of a pilot, two paramedics or flight doctors plus full life-support medical equipment. Operating from strategically located regional air bases, the maximum flying time to hospital from anywhere in the region is less than 15 minutes.

What is not widely known is that Midlands Air Ambulance Charity receives no Government or National Lottery funding. In excess of £6.5 million is needed each year to keep its three air ambulances operational, funding which is donated entirely by the public and local businesses, with four in ten missions funded by Gifts in Wills.

If a patient reaches hospital within 60 minutes of injury, (referred to as the Golden Hour), their chances of survival are dramatically increased. That is why the rapid response of Midlands Air Ambulance is so vital in an emergency.

The charity is fortunate to count on tremendous public support and good will, but never takes this for granted. Winning and keeping hearts and minds is an essential and constant challenge. That is why it regards the real 'helicopter heroes' as not only the medical crews, but also those often unsung, ground heroes, its fundraisers and volunteers.

Saving lives with your support

Welcome to the winter edition of Take Off, where once again I am delighted to share some of our most recent news, activities and events with you.

So far in 2014 we have held three of our most successful fundraising events to date, and I am proud to say that this is down to you, our loyal supporters. There was an amazing turnout for our Bike4Life Ride Out and Festival, while our Recognition Awards and Charity Ball was a great way to recognise our unsung heroes. Our annual Open Day at our Strensham airbase was a real family affair – it was great to see so many people being able to learn more about what we do in such a hands-on way. These three events combined to raise over £100,000 which ultimately means we can undertake 40 further life saving air ambulance missions in the region, something I am personally very proud of.

You may know that we have extended our service to 14 hours per day, flying in the hours of darkness between lit helipads, to and from the specialist hospitals across our region. This is significant and allows us to continue ensuring that patients reach the hospital best suited to their needs, not simply the one that is closest. Historically we flew just eight hours per day during the winter, so we are extremely pleased to have achieved this milestone. Over the next six months we'll be closely monitoring patient benefits and if it proves successful, we'll be exploring options to extend our vitally important service even further in future.

In this edition, I'd also like to introduce you to the men and women who work on the Air Desk at West Midlands Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust, who are an integral part of the team. They are tasked with dispatching our three aircraft to the most serious or remotely located incidents in the Midlands. Their support means we reach patients and take them to the most appropriate specialist hospital as swiftly as possible – we simply couldn't operate without them.

Lastly, I would like to thank all of our supporters, volunteers and corporate partners for all their hard work, dedication and commitment throughout 2014. Hearing about your amazing fundraising feats and achievements is a constant delight and we are privileged to have you on board.

Enjoy this edition of Take Off and, as we face the dark nights and winter months, please do take good care of yourselves and your loved ones, particularly out on the roads, to ensure you're never in need of our service.

'Spruced' up tractor keeps fundraising on track

Members of the Bridgnorth Vintage Machinery Club have been 600 tractors take part and thousands of eager spectators stalwart supporters of the charity for two decades and have raised over £50,000, directly funding 20 life saving missions.

Here's an insight into what they've been up to in 2014:

Over £13,600 was raised following the raffle of a restored 1961 International B275 tractor at the National Vintage Tractor Road Run, which was held in Bridgnorth. Bridgnorth Vintage Machinery Club chairman, David Spruce, and members of the club acquired the tractor and lovingly restored it to its former glory. The club decided to raffle the tractor for MAAC to assist with the charity's life saving work across the region, including the rural communities in Shropshire.

In the six months leading up to the much-anticipated 25 mile National Vintage Tractor Road Run, the club sold thousands of raffle tickets, with the renovated tractor as the star prize. The raffle was drawn after the main event, which saw

On donating the funds to MAAC, David Spruce said: "It was the first time anywhere in Shropshire had hosted the National event. With the help of lots of people in and around Shropshire we were able to give the Midlands Air Ambulance a cheque for £13,603, and we will be presenting another cheque to the charity before the end of the year."

MAAC volunteer, Gina Constable, said: "What David and the members of the Bridgnorth Vintage Machinery Club have achieved in the last 20 years is outstanding and most recently they have worked extremely hard to restore the old tractor to raise money for the Midlands Air Ambulance. It has been an absolute pleasure and honour to work alongside them for the last two decades of fundraising, and while we started out as a group of fundraisers, I would now count them all as very dear friends."

Shoppers enjoyed custard carnage!

Bathroom City and high street store BHS teamed up with the charity for a bathtub sit-in fundraising challenge, which raised over £1,000. Bathroom City supplied the bathtub and 380 tins of custard used at the event in Merry Hill Shopping Centre's BHS store

Instead of opting for the traditional baked beans-in-abath fundraiser, the charity conducted a social media poll before the day and thousands of Facebook fans voted on what gungy concoction would be used to fill the tub. Rice pudding, tinned spaghetti and soup were among the options but custard turned out to be the most popular choice.

Bathroom City's Matt Passmore said: "What started out as a straightforward bath sit-in rapidly turned into a gunge-fest! We were delighted to be able to help such a worthwhile charity and the team from BHS were fantastic to work with. I was just glad I didn't have to go in the bath myself!"

SURVIVOR STORY

"Thanks to Midlands Air Ambulance, I got the best treatment available to help me recover after a tragic car accident."

Like many 23-year-olds, Steven Burns from Cannock was into his cars. But as a sensible driver, he never envisaged being in an accident that would almost kill him.

It was a warm July evening and Steven was at a friend's birthday party at a local pub, but as he was driving his pride and joy, a Ford Escort, he decided not to drink that night. While outside chatting about cars with a couple of people from the birthday party, one of his friends was showing off his new car and offered to take Steven for a quick spin.

Steven states: "I loved my car, so was always careful while driving as I didn't want to damage it, or myself for that matter. I thought my friend would have felt the same about his, but unfortunately not."

He explains what happened next: "I was a bit apprehensive as my other friend didn't want to come in the car and as soon as we pulled out of the pub car park, I knew he was showing off. He was driving way too fast and we were only a mile from the pub when the car mounted a kerb and we hurled into a brick wall head on. My memory about what happened after that is very patchy."

Steven drifted in and out of consciousness, and although he knew they had been in a crash, he couldn't figure out what was happening around him. He continues: "It all felt like a dream and it was very surreal. There were lots of people around the car, local residents who'd heard the crash, and the emergency services. I was in a lot of pain, especially in my neck and down my spine, which worried me the most."

Due to the impact, Steven had broken one of his vertebrae in his neck. Despite this, he was the lucky one – the driver of the car tragically died in the impact of the crash.

"At the time I didn't know he had died and due to my injuries I couldn't turn my head. Looking back now, that was a good thing, as I wouldn't have wanted to see him."

To release Steven from the vehicle, the paramedics on the scene worked closely with the fire brigade to cut him out of the car and get him to the local hospital, Walsall Manor, as quickly a possible.

On assessing his condition, the land crew paramedics made the decision that Steven needed treatment at Stoke Hospital, which is a specialist trauma centre for back and neck injuries, but the drive by land ambulance would have taken well over an hour.

As well as attending incident scenes, two per cent of Midlands Air Ambulance's missions are hospital transfers,

"I was strapped onto a spinal board and taken to the aircraft, which was a really cool experience. At this point I wasn't in so much pain, and I can't tell if that was from the medication or the excitement of going in the helicopter! The flight paramedics were fantastic and kept talking to me to reassure me about what was happening as I was hooked up to a lot of monitors. I remember thinking 'wow I'm in a helicopter, but I wish I could see out of the window'. It was such an incredible experience and one I will never forget.

On arrival at Stoke Hospital, Steven was rushed in for X-Rays, plus a CT and MRI scan to assess his back and neck. He was taken into theatre where the surgeons took a bone graft from his hip and pinned it in place with a titanium plate to help mend his vertebrae.

Steven was in hospital for ten days and spent the rest of his recovery at home. "The team at Stoke Hospital said I made an incredible recovery. Thanks to the paramedics on scene and the speedy transfer to the specialist hospital via the Midlands Air Ambulance, I had the very best treatment available to me," adds Steven.

"Although I'm limited to about 80 per cent movement in my neck, I count myself extremely lucky to be alive and I'm still able to enjoy an active lifestyle. I love mountain biking and riding my BMX as well as going on track days with my car. It could have been such a different outcome and I can't thank the air crew from Midlands Air Ambulance enough for giving me the best possible chance to make such a good recovery."

PATIENT CARE EACHES NEW HEIGHTS

In MAAC's 23-year history, the charity has only been able to operate its three air ambulance helicopters during the hours of daylight, this has now changed.

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ROAD TRAFFIC ACCIDEN

Thanks to clinical and operational research into the increasing demand for the service, coupled with on going public support of the charity, the Midlands Air Ambulance aircrews now take to the skies into the hours of darkness.

Previously, the charity's three aircraft operated 14 hours per day between 7am and 9pm in

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the summer months, which was reduced to just eight hours of daylight during the winter months. Thanks to generous donations from the local

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communities and businesses, the charity is now in a position to extend the operating hours of the service to 14 hours per day all year round.

Becky Tinsley, air operations manager for MAAC, explains: "Due to demand for our service exceeding daylight hours, we have invested a proportion of the public's donations into flying our aircraft into the evenings.

> "At this stage, it means that we will carry out our full Helicopter Emergency Medical Service (HEMS) during daylight hours, and will fly between lit helipads in the hours of darkness, taking patients to the most appropriate specialist trauma hospital for their needs."

Becky adds: "This expansion is another significant milestone for MAAC, and is the first step towards the provision of HEMS during the night across the Midlands. While undertaking air ambulance missions at night is part of our strategic plan, we cannot achieve this goal without further aircrew training and investment in facilities and medical supplies, which is why the public's continued support is required now more than ever."

SURVIVOR STORY

"You never know when you may need the Midlands Air Ambulance. Thankfully they were there for me when I needed them the most."

While mountain biking increases in popularity in the UK, inevitably so does the number of accidents. Adam Jackson, a hire manager at Travis Perkins from the Vale of Evesham in Worcestershire, knows all too well that while mountain biking is a fantastic sport, it does have its dangers.

Adam often rode with a group of friends and colleagues, taking in the views, tackling the tough terrain and enjoying the challenge the sport presents. The 11th March 2012, was just such a day, when Adam and a group of friends decided to take a trip to the Malvern Hills.

"The weather was fine and sunny and it promised to be a good day's riding," Adam recalls. "It was my first ride at the Malvern's but I had ridden with the same group at various other locations. I remember being at the top and taking in the breath-taking views before being one of the last of the group to take on the steep descent."

Adam adds: "The ride had been fantastic with great climbs combined with quick descents. I recall riding along a gradual decline on a track close to Gullet Quarry on the return run. The next thing I knew, I woke up in hospital."

Friends who were close by said he appeared to lose control of his bike with no obvious sign, and was catapulted into the air before landing on his head. Despite wearing protective clothing and a helmet, he suffered a number of injuries including a severe head injury as well as a broken eye socket and nose, and trauma damage to his lungs.

Due to the remote location of Adam's accident, it wasn't possible for a land ambulance crew to attend the scene quickly, so the Midlands Air Ambulance from the Strensham airbase in Worcestershire was dispatched to assist.

Piloted by captain Wayne Goudie, the aircraft landed as close as safely possible to the accident scene. Critical care paramedics Jim Hancox and Greg Ambler made the run to Adam and arrived at the incident scene within a matter of minutes. They could quickly see the seriousness of Adam's injuries and were faced with the immediate challenge of stabilising him so that they could start to treat his head injury.

Jim Hancox states: "When we arrived on scene it was clear that Adam had sustained a serious head injury.



He had a reduced level of consciousness so our priority was to manage Adam's airway, assess him for any other injuries and immobilise him to ensure that he didn't suffer any further trauma."

As time was of the essence, the MAA aircrew transferred Adam to the aircraft and flew him to the QE Hospital in Birmingham, one of the country's major trauma centres, a journey that took just 15 minutes.

At hospital, Adam was placed on life support and remained in a coma for three weeks. He was later transferred to Moseley Hall Hospital, and remained there for a further three months while he recovered from his horrific injuries.

Adam continues: "I had to learn to walk and verbalise again but I still believe in pushing myself to the limit in other ways because I'm a driven individual and every day is a great one!

"I feel because I am personally quite a driven individual it has helped me to achieve my goals, but I can honestly say that without the help and support I have received, who knows where I'd be. While there are still daily struggles, I know without Midlands Air Ambulance, it would have been a very different story."

His wife Judith shares Adam's sentiment, and said: "You all do a fantastic job without you my husband would not be alive."
